- B. Student Drop Dates
 - a. TTU does not have a drop date later than ASU
 - i. 10/29/18 @ TTU
 - ii. 11/1/18 @ ASU
 - iii. Other peer institutions are similar (in the same week)
 - iv. Drop date consideration deals with % of semester completed and Federal Financial Aid policies
 - v. How often do Dean's authorize latedrops?
 - 1. Deans don't like it, but it exists for "catastrophic event" in a student's life
 - 2. Deans would prefer to move the drop deadline later. Provost is not lobbying for that.

- vi. Some faculty would prefer a 1 week later time, due to mid-terms.
- vii. Coincidental that Spring 19 registration was the same time as drop this fall
 - 1. If drop date is after the next semester registration begins it could be problematic
- viii. Calendar is set for Spring 19, so we can continue conversation for Fall 20 potential changes
- ix. Financial Aid is coming to the December FS meeting; we can bring up this conversation then
- C. OP 6.02 Update
 - a. Provost office will track
 - b. New language for #6 -A reduced teaching load may be granted when a faculty member has taught a load in excess of the normal requirements. Faculty overload information will be maintained by the Provost's Office. Faculty who teach overloads that equal one regularly scheduled full semester course over a two year rolling period will be eligible for a course release the following semester.
 - i. P/VPAA We currently don't pay (or give time off equivalence) for fractional overloads, this would allow for those fractional overloads to be accumulated and paid.
 - ii. P/VPAA If a faculty cannot take a reduced load, then there can be monetary compensation.
 - c. Referred back to committee for part 6 clarification/revision
- D. Update on Merit Pay Policy
 - a. If all who were eligible applied and were awarded it would be approximately \$110K
 - b. P/VPAA in support but funds are lacking. 1% raise is about \$600K across the board which is a recurring expense. Also impacts SS benefits and costs.
 - c. P/VPAA those here the longest are hurt the most due to salary wage increases for lower rank/newer faculty. We have done a market adjustment at times. It is extremely difficult.
 - d. 06.30 Merit Pay for Senior Instructors/Clinical Faculty, has been approved as an OP
 - e. the full professor OP has not been approved as an OP. Was "approved in concept" in May 2016
 - f. Could a formula be created to help implementation?
 - g. MG will send OP06.xx from 2016 to the senate to review and consider.
