### 2024-2025 UIL Constitution and Contest Rules

Contest Rules: ACADEMICS

### Section 901: ACADEMIC CONTEST ETHICS CODE

- a. The Academic Contest ethics code shall carry the force of rule. Member school districts, member schools and/or covered school district personnel who violate any of the provisions of this code shall be subject to penalty.
  - Participate in contests in the spirit of fairness and sportsmanship, observing all rules

     both in letter and in spirit.
  - Sponsor and advise individuals and teams without resorting to unethical tactics, trickery that attempts to skirt the rules, or any other unfair tactic which detracts from sound educational principles.
  - 3. Accept decisions of officials and judges without protest and extend protection and courtesy to officials.
  - 4. Regard opponents as guests or hosts while placing personal and/or team integrity above victory at any cost. Maintain grace and poise in victory or defeat. Conduct that berates, intimidates, or threatens competitors has no place in interscholastic activities.
  - 5. Provide information or evidence regarding eligibility of any contestant or school to local school administrators or to the appropriate judicial bodies upon request.
  - 6. Understand and appreciate the educational values of competition and abstain from modifying or soliciting another teacher to modify grades for eligibility purposes, knowing that such behavior defeats the character-building purposes of extracurricular competition.
  - Abstain from any practice that makes a student feel pressured to participate in nonschool activities.

- 8. At all times, ensure that competition is relative to a more important overall educational effort, using competition as a tool in the preparation of students for citizenship and successful adulthood.
- 9. Ensure that UIL Academic district, regional and state meets receive precedence over non-qualifying contests or meets.
- 10. School districts shall notify the academic district or regional meet director no later than the end of the second school day following academic district or regional competition if a student or a team knows that it will not compete at the next higher academic meet.
- b. SALARY/STIPEND. Any salary or stipend arrangement which makes it to the financial interest of a coach, director or sponsor to win a UIL Contest will be in violation of the Academics Ethics Code, and the member school district, member school and the school district personnel shall be subject to the range of penalties outlined in Sections 27 and 29.

### ENTRIES AND CERTIFICATION/ELIGIBILITY

All Academic entries, including One-Act Play, are certified and entered into the Regional Meet through the UIL Spring Meet Online System. The eligibility of a student competing at the regional meet is the responsibility of the individual school.

### **FEES**

In order to expedite the payment process for the 2024 Region 2-1A Spring Meet, the Regional Director has authorized the following flat rate fee schedule:

Academic entry fee per district

\$2,970

How the member schools constituting the district divide the full slate fees for Academics and Athletics among themselves is the business of the member schools within the district and the district's Spring Meet Chairperson. All fees are non-refundable. Please refer to Schedule of Fees on page 12.

The District Spring Meet Chair for each district represented in Region 2-1A will collect the academic and athletic fees for that district and submit one check by <u>April 21</u>.

### **ACADEMIC CONFLICTS**

If a student who has followed the State Conflict Pattern earns eligibility to compete at the regional level in more than one event and finds that he/she has a full or partial conflict in the two events, he/she must make a choice of which contest will be participated in. No adjustments will be considered to accommodate the conflict.

### **VERIFICATION, AWARDS, STATE MEET INFORMATION**

Students, their coaches, and/or other school officials are urged to attend all verification periods and awards meetings. Regional meet directors are under no obligation to contact winners who fail to attend awards meetings with results. Information regarding the UIL Academic State Meet is posted on the <u>UIL Texas</u> web site. Information packets will not be mailed to schools or handed out during the regional meet verification meetings or awards ceremonies except for One-Act Play and L-D debate. Coaches and contestants must go to the UIL web site for the State Meet tentative schedule, UT campus map, UT parking, and other vital State Meet information. Responsibility for knowing times, dates, and sites of State Meet events rests solely with coaches and contestants. Second place regional teams should also look for the list of wild card qualifiers.

### MEDALS, PLAQUES, TROPHIES

Individual and team awards will be given in compliance with UIL specifications and guidelines. All trophies and medals are awarded according to the uniform state plan and are uniform in all regions. Academic awards will be presented at the verification/contest site after official results. Athletic awards will be presented at the site of the competition. Please plan to be present for awards for your event or have someone from your school present. Unclaimed awards will NOT be mailed.

### WITHDRAWALS AND TARDINESS

A school that withdraws a student from a Regional Meet is responsible for notifying the appropriate alternate and the Regional Director. Refunds of entry fees for withdrawals will not be made. A list of absent contestants will be reported to the State UIL office from each academic event. It is vitally important that you notify the Regional Director in advance if a contestant will be unable to attend the regional competition.

### SMOKING, OPEN CARRY, AND CAMPUS CARRY POLICIES

Smoking and the use of all tobacco products is only allowed in designated smoking-permitted areas.

Pursuant to the law, open carry is not permitted by a license holder on the premises of an institution of higher education.

A law passed by the 84th Texas Legislature and effective August 1, 2016, changes the approach to carrying a concealed handgun on higher education campuses in Texas. The law is often referred to as "campus carry," but it is officially Texas Senate Bill 11: Carrying of Handguns by License Holders on Certain Campuses.

Texas statutes prohibits concealed carry on the premises where any UIL sanctioned competition is being held. Buildings where concealed carry is normally permitted but will be used for UIL competitions will have portable 30.06 signs placed at the entrances. ### **Academic Conflict Pattern**

The Academic Conflict Pattern is not mandated at district. However, districts are strongly encouraged to follow it. The conflict pattern will be strictly observed at all region meets and at the UIL Academic State Meet. Contests in a given set do not conflict with contests in any other set, with the exception of restrictions in speaking events. For example, Number Sense in Set 1 does not conflict with Accounting in Set 2 or with Social Studies in Set 3.

Set 1 3 hours

(i.e. 8-11 a.m.)

Only the following contests will be held during Set

1. These contests may be scheduled at the same time:

- Current Issues & Events
- Ready Writing
- Prose prelims
- Poetry prelims
- Lincoln-Douglas debate prelims

Each of the above contests conflicts with:

- Calculator Applications
- Number Sense

Calculator Applications, Number Sense and Computer Applications may not be held at the same time.

These contests may be scheduled at the same time:

- Computer Applications
- Copy Editing

These contests may not be scheduled at the same time:

- Ready Writing
- Copy Editing

Set 2 2 1/2 hours

(i.e. 11 a.m. -1:30 p.m.)

Only the following contests will be held during Set 2. These contests may be scheduled at the same time:

- Accounting
- Informative Speaking
- Persuasive Speaking
- Science
- Spelling & Vocabulary

Each of the above contests conflicts with:

- Feature Writing
- News Writing

Feature Writing and News Writing may not be held at the same time.

Set 3 2 hours (i.e. 1:30 p.m. -3:30 p.m.)

Only the following contests will be held during Set
3. These contests may be scheduled at the same time:

- Social Studies
- LD finals
- Prose finals
- Poetry finals

Each of the above conflicts with:

- Computer Science
- Editorial Writing
- Headline Writing
- Mathematics

Editorial Writing and Headline Writing may not be held at the same time.


Computer Science and Mathematics may not be held at the same time.

Set 4 2 1/2 hours (i.e. 3:30-6 p.m.)

Only the following contests will be held during Set 4. These contests may be scheduled at the same time:

- Computer Science (Programming session)
- Informative finals
- Literary Criticism
- Persuasive finals

### **Academic Conflict Pattern**



The following events may begin at the same time: Prose, Poetry, Lincoln-Douglas Debate, Ready Writing\*, Computer Applications\* and Current Issues & Events. Calculator Applications, Number Sense and Computer Applications may not be held at the same time. Students may also participate in both Current Issues & Events and Computer Applications so long as they are set up and do not delay the start of the Computer Applications contest. Number Sense and Calculator Applications conflict with Current Issues & Events, Ready Writing, Prose/Poetry interpretation and Lincoln-Douglas debate. Ready Writing and Copy Editing may not be scheduled at same time. Computer Applications and Copy Editing may be held at same time.

Set 2 The following events may begin at the same time: Informative Speaking, Persuasive Speaking, Spelling & Vocabulary, Science and Accounting. News Writing\* and Feature Writing\* may not be held at the same time. Note: Informative and Persuasive Speaking finals and Computer Science Programming may conflict.

Set 3 The following events may be held at the same time: Mathematics, Social Studies, Prose, Poetry and Lincoln-Douglas Debate. Editorial Writing\* and Headline Writing may not be held at the same time. Computer Science and Mathematics shall not be held at the same time.

Set 4 The following events may begin at the same time: Informative Speaking finals, Persuasive Speaking finals, Literary Criticism and 2.5 Hours Computer Science Programming. Programming is administered at all levels of competition - district, regional and state.

NOTE: Teams must also have at least 30 additional minutes earlier in the day to set up equipment. The equipment set up may take place at any point during the contest day; all team members are not required to be present for equipment set up.

<sup>\*-</sup> Events utilizing computers (Computer Applications, Editorial, Feature, News, and Ready Writing) must have at least 30 additional minutes earlier than indicated on the chart to set-up equipment. The contestant is not required to be present far equipment set-up.

<sup>\*\*-</sup> The 2.5 hour block indicated for Computer Science hands-on programming allows 30 minutes for roll call, preliminary announcements and the "dry run" practice problem, followed by a full two hours for the actual contest.

### City of San Angelo

San Angelo is the center of a thriving community of 100,000 and the city nearest the geographic center of Texas. For some, San Angelo is the true heart of Texas. San Angelo has a rich and culturally diverse history. Though the city owes its birth to the establishment of Fort Concho along the Concho River in 1867, various Indian tribes, as well as Spanish conquistadors and priests, traversed the area for centuries before that. They were followed by buffalo soldiers and pioneer ranchers, who opened the way for merchants, bankers provides water displays, dramatic lighting and a fourand educators in San Angelo and Tom Green County.

This diverse heritage is celebrated annually through the Juneteenth Celebration, the Fiestas Patrias, the Diez y Seis de Septiembre festivities and Frontier Day at Fort Concho National Historic Site, as well as Christmas at Old Fort Concho. And, in honor of Independence Day, the community comes together for a grand celebration that includes a patriotic pops concert and fireworks display July 3 at the River Stage on the banks of the Concho River downtown and a July 4 fireworks show over Lake Nasworthy. The annual rodeo and livestock show in the spring and the roping fiesta each fall pay homage to the region's ranching roots.

San Angelo is also a cultural paradise. The San Angelo Symphony, the San Angelo Civic Ballet, and Angelo Civic Theatre offer a variety of programs annually. The San Angelo Performing Arts Campus (SAPAC) brings even more choices for entertainment with stage performances by local companies, San Angelo Broadway Academy and traveling Broadway productions, such as "Legally Blonde." The San Angelo Museum of Fine Arts with its distinctive architecture provides a wonderful setting for exhibits by some of Texas' finest artists. Historical displays at Fort Concho and the Railway Museum of San Angelo attract visitors from throughout the nation. Downtown boasts a series of historical murals and public art in the most unexpected places.

The Cactus Hotel is a local landmark, which serves as the center of numerous cultural activities. Visitors along the River Walk enjoy the prize-winning sculpture of the "Pearl of the Conchos," a West Texas mermaid holding a symbolic Concho Pearl, a pink gem unique to the waters of the Concho River around

Natural beauty is also found with the International Water Lily Garden in full color between March and September. It is complemented by the Sunken Garden, Rio Concho Garden, Terrace Garden and Gazebo Garden, all part of the city's system of municipal parks. The River Walk along the Concho mile trail for enjoying nature.

The Nature Center on the outskirts of town by Lake Nasworthy is a regional museum and learning facility. Lake Nasworthy—along with O.C. Fisher Reservoir and Twin Buttes Reservoir—provides residents and visitors a variety of water sport opportunities, from fishing to water skiing. Adjacent to Fisher Reservoir, San Angelo State Park sits astride the junction of four ecological zones, making the park one of the most diverse natural preserves in all of Texas.

San Angelo is home to Goodfellow Air Force Base, as well as a strong business community that includes such national corporations as SITEL, Goodyear and Ethicon. Additionally, San Angelo is a regional medical center.

Overall, San Angelo has all the advantages of a large city—numerous civic and cultural events, ample shopping, varied entertainment options, a solid business community and more—along with all the charm of a small town, ranging from safe streets to friendly people. That combination helps make San Angelo an ideal environment for a college education.




